It would be appropriate to mention the transfer of Mr S. L. Radford to Cambridge in March 1967. He has served on the Committee for the past three years and has been a valued senior oarsman having twice obtained second place in the Champion Pairs. His resignation is accepted with regret and with best wishes for his future

Although not within the scope of this Report, the news of yet another transfer has just been received. Mr A. L. Brown who is due to transfer to Nelson during late May 1967, is indeed a serious loss to the Club. Alan Brown joined Star from Timaru in 1956 and in his first season with us won Senior events. In all he has won no fewer than 17 senior status races for Star which would certainly have been more but for a gap of two years when he was away from Wellington. He has served on the Committee for many years and has held office as Club Captain, for many years and has held office as Club Captain, Deputy Club Captain and Secretary. In addition, he has and is currently a member of the New Zealand Rowing Council thus his transfer is not only a loss to Star but also to New Zealand rowing generally. His wife has also given sterling work for the Club on a number of Ladies Committees. The Committees' very best wishes go with Alan and Mrs Brown on their transfer to Nelson.

#### PLANT

Generally the Club's racing plant is in very good condition but except for the smaller boats there is a positive need for some replacements. It is obvious that the greatest requirement is for a racing eight and a racing four but this will involve a considerable financial outlay. As mentioned earlier finance raising schemes will need to be introduced if this plant is to be purchased.

Much of the training plant is now some years old and will require a complete overhaul this winter if it is to be in good rowing order next season. The old eight "Sirus" is now 17 years old and is virtually beyond economic repair. The plywood boats although ageing, fill a positive need especially for Novices and for College rowing. Much work is therefore required on these boats during the off-season.

A new racing pair was purchased during the season from the finance made available from the Centennial Committee. This purchase completes the Club's racing small boat plant which would now be second to none and is confirmed by the Senior results over the past

two seasons.

A stock of 10 racing oars and two sets of sculls were landed from F. Collar Ltd. in January. These oars are sightly longer than our present oars and are a wel-

come addition to the Club's racing stock.

Whilst the Club possesses a relatively large amount of plant there must be a considerable job done on maintenance if the boats are to be in good order for next season. Members are therefore urged to assist with this if even for only a few hours.

A list of the Club's plant appears as an Appendix to

this report.

# COACHING AND TRAINING

The work and dedication of a small band of coaches is directly related to the improved standard of rowing in the Club. The coaching was mainly handled by Messrs D. A. Cameron (maidens), F. L. Scott (novices) and N. C. Lynch (juniors), with also Messrs J. Morgan, R. O. Weenink, A. R. Scott and D. J. McGuire assisting, looked after the coaching of crews this season.

It will be seen that in the senior classes coaching is very limited but this season the seniors have set a good example in their training which has reflected throughout

For the 5th successive year the Club set up a training camp at Wairau from 26th December to 2nd January. There is no doubt that the 30 members who attended this camp improved immeasurably which is is confirmed by a glance at the regatta results. Messrs D. A. Cameron, F. L. Scott, D. J. McGuire and A. R. Scott were kept busy coaching the crews. The Club is again indebted to the Wairau Rowing Club for the assistance given without which this rowing camp would not be possible. The ready assistance given by the Blenheim Rowing Club is also acknowledged with appreciation.

# CLUBHOUSE

As stated in the introductory paragraph it will be necessary, in a few years time, to rebuild on another

location. The date of this move is still not known but will most certainly be made when the Harbour Board's plans to reclaim in front of the Clubhouse are put into effect.

The Club at present has a 5 year lease which is due to expire in 1970 but as earlier stated tentative plans

should now be made for our future location.

The Clubhouse is generally in a sound condition despite its 83 years. The roof requires some repairs over the locker room but elsewhere the roof has either been completely renewed or repaired.

Early last season all lockers were removed which has greatly enlarged the locker room and can now be used for indoor exercises. In addition the locker room was given a new coat of paint and now has a much

more attractive appearance.

The floor in the boat bays has been repaired in some places but in others requires replacing. A small door has been built into one of the large doors facing the street. This was done so that all doors can be properly locked and members can gain entrance through the new smaller door. This door will be fitted with a lock and members issued with a limited number of keys.

A large window was installed in the hall and this has greatly improved the appearance and gives a panoramic view of the harbour. With this and the previous extensive renovations the Club possesses a most attractive hall which was, no doubt, appreciated by many members during the Centennial Celebrations.

# STATUS REGATTAS

The Club competed at the Wairau, Picton, Wellington. Wanganui and N.Z. Championship status regattas. In addition a limited number of crews started at the Christchurch and Auckland Championships whilst individual crews also competed at Alexandra, Whakatane and Rotorua. In all a record number of 27 wins was achieved with 35 seconds and 18 thirds.

A very pleasing feature was the success gained by Club crews in all divisions showing a good depth of strength. In the main the Seniors and to some extent the Juniors trained and raced in the smaller boats whilst Maidens, Youths and Novices were in the larger boats. Another feature was the consistency of most crews and this is illustrated by the following crews who were never out of a place during the whole season.
Senior coxed and coxless pairs, Senior Double Sculls,
Junior Double and Single Sculls, Maiden and Youth
Eights, Youth Four and Novice Four.

The Club was entered in four Championships events for a second, third and a fourth. J. G. Gibbons and S. L. Radford had competed with success during the season in both the coxed and coxless events. As a result hopes were high for Star to gain its first Championship since 1936. In the coxless event Star easily won their elimination heat to enter the final but in the coxed pairs they were required to win their repercharge before taking their place in the final. In the Champion Coxless Pairs final Star led for 1500 metres but could not hold on over the final 500 metres and finished second to Whakatipu. They were also placed in the Coxed Pairs final finishing in third place. The Champion Double Sculls entry was A. Dowling and C. Bridge who were in fact the winners of the Junior Doubles and they were narrowly

beaten into fourth place in the Championship event.

A. Dowling also won the Junior Single sculls and was unlucky to be disqualified in the Champion Single sculls repercharge heat. It can confidently be said that but for this he would have been placed in the Champion

Singles Final.

The above wins and placings together with the Maiden and Youth Eights being placed second and the Novice and Youth Fours third placings gained sufficient points for the Club to win the Centennial Oars. This is the second time the Club has won the coveted trophy, the other being also at Lake Waihola in 1965.

# LOCAL REGATTAS

The Club had mixed fortunes in local regattas until The Club had mixed fortunes in local regattas until the rowing camp was held over the New Year period. Only the Queen's Cup regatta was won by Star during this period, other regattas being the Redding Shield, Norton Cup and Jury Cup at Wanganui. After the New Year the Club competed in two local regattas—the Woolworths Cup at Wanganui and the Mothes Shield, this year held in conjunction with the Wollington Chempion. year held in conjunction with the Wellington Championship regatta, with Star winning both regattas quite com-fortably. It may be pertinent to note that this is also

the second time the Club has won the Woolworth's Cup at Wanganui and on each occasion the Centennial Oars

has also been won.

As in Status regattas a feature in the local regattas was the consistency of some of crews notably the Senior coxed and coxless pairs, Senior Double and Single sculls, Junior Double and Single sculls, Maiden and Youth Eights, Maiden Fours and Pairs and Youth and Novice Fours.

Local regatta winners also appear as an Appendix

to this Report.

# SECONDARY SCHOOLS ROWING:

There are now a number of Secondary Schools within the Wellington District who have adopted rowing as a Summer sport generally sponsored by one of the local rowing clubs. Star's responsibility in this regard extends to both Rongotai and Wellington Colleges. Although now transferred to Onslow College, Mr N. C. Lynch has continued to coach Rongotai College. Lynch has continued to coach Rongotal College crews, and has done a very fine job. Mr P. Savage is the rowing master at Rongotai and has done a fine administrative

It is clear, however, that the coaching of College crews, especially where there is no master at the College conversant with rowing, creates a problem because Club members can give only limited assistance in coaching when college crews train during the working hours of

most members.

This problem was partly solved by selecting College rowers as members of the Club's crews and thus obtain the benefit of such coaching as was given to the Club crew. The obvious restriction is of course that only a limited number of schoolboy rowers are able to train

with club crews.

Another solution was to invite the schoolboy rowers to the Club's rowing camp at Wairau and it was pleasing to see the number of Rongotal members who attended. Mr D. McGuire spent many hours coaching the schoolboy rowers and of course some rowed in the Club's Youth and Maiden Eights under the guidance of Mr D. A. Cameron. In fact it was four members of the Star Youth Eight who later won the Secondary School Springbok Shield fours race.

There is no doubt that the growth of Schoolboy rowing in Wellington, in which Mr N. Lynch has played such a large part, has increased the strength of local

clubs.
